The NAD Leadership Training Institute commenced on September 21st in Albuquerque, NM. Many topics aligned with MCDHH's wish list. Becky Davis attended workshops regarding Social Media and Learning Platforms, and Advocating with Senior Citizens. There were just under 300 participants from all over the nation either representing their state or presenting. Some familiar faces to our readers will include MoAD President Lawrence Yates and Secretary Tiara Mason, as well as MoAD member and MCDHH Chair, Clark Corogenes. There was a lot of time to chat, catch up, and network with individuals from neighboring states such as Kansas (Collette Barnes-Maelzer) and Nebraska (Kim Davis and John Arteaga and colleagues). NAD will host their biennial conference in Chicago for July 1-6, 2024. The

NMSD had Jr. NAD members at the conference and involved with the events. It was nice to see Deaf and Hard of Hearing youth leading activities and assisting with presentations.



Commissioner Wendy Jensen co-presented with Davis at the MO-CASE conference. The presentation was to a small group regarding "Interpreters in Missouri Classrooms: What Special Education Administrators Need to Know". Through discussion and questions, the ideas of deaf and hard of hearing students having peers, language

modeling and access rang loud. LEAD-K was discussed briefly, but also shared resources and ideas for students. Don't forget, we have been asking and developing a list of people who might serve as

Starkloff Disability Employment Summit took place in the St. Louis area. MCDHH's Director, Becky Davis, and Deaf Advocate, Sonya Smith attended. Speakers touched on different experiences and challenges they overcame to succeed in their field. Other speakers addressed how to work with people to make employment environments more accessible and open to individuals who may do things differently than they are used to doing. Two speakers were very familiar to Sonya Smith (RIT-

NTID alumnus). Gerard Buckley, the President of NTID and Vice-president of RIT presented on hiring and employment practices when working with Deaf or hard of hearing individuals. He stated that approximately 50% of the deaf and hard of hearing workforce is not employed. He advised HR representatives on how to welcome deaf applicants and offered ideas on how to retain them. Ami Fornah Sankoh, also a graduate of RIT's NTID,

presented on her journey into the world of chemistry. Ms. Fornah is the first Deaf Black woman to earn a STEM doctorate and has recently taken a position with Dow, The Materials Science Company. Her story is of resilience and perseverance.

The MCDHH staff attended two events for the Taste of Technology. One at KU Edwards campus in Overland Park, KS, and, another at Deaf, Inc. in Webster Groves, MO. The Taste of Technology events aim to create a supportive and inclusive environment where people can attend to gain knowledge, build social connections, and advocate for more inclusive and accessible for the DeafBlind individuals. They also provide various communication methods to accommodate the unique needs of DeafBlind individuals using tactile sign language and communication devices. During this event, MCDHH and other vendors promoted a variety of resources relating to accessibility, technology, and advocacy with the goal of assisting others to advance their daily living skills and navigate their daily lives independently.

MCDHH Staff attended the Deaf Cultural Event at the Nelson-Atkins Museum. Amber Carter and Jo Martin greeted the public, shared information and answered questions. There were over 500 people in attendance. The event also included an appearance from Rosa Lee Timm.



Fun Fact



Granville Seymour Redmond (1871-1935)

Redmond became deaf due to Scarlet fever by the age of three, he attended California School for the Deaf (Fremont). After graduation, Redmond attended Julian Academy in Paris where he studied art among Benjamin Constant and Jean-Paul Laurens. After returning to California, he was well known for bright, floral landscape paintings which attracted the actor, Charlie Chaplin. From there, they became friends, and then Redmond made some appearances in eight silent movies. Redmond was the first deaf person to appear in the movies, and Chaplin used sign language that he learned from Redmond. In *A Dog's Life*, you can see Chaplin fingerspell "baby" and "children", which truly excited the Deaf viewers at that time.

About Trauma Informed Interpreting

ASL is a direct and descriptive language. Because it's so visual, when a DeafLEAD trauma informed interpreter is using trauma-sensitive interpreting, signs may be replaced with signs or gestures that are more neutral as to mitigate retraumatizing the survivor. Starting with having a better understand the definition of 'Trauma', then learning how it affects ASL interpreters and their process and production when working with survivors is the foundation of TII.

The Annual Missouri Interpreters Conference will be held at Metropolitan Community College—Penn Valley in Kansas City, MO in the Education Center on April 4th—6th, 2024. The Missouri Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing is soliciting presentation/workshop proposals for that conference. Over 650 participants are expected to attend this conference. In order to best serve the professional development needs of all conference participants, proposals are requested for presentations/workshops at all levels - beginning, intermediate, and advanced.

Proposals for presentations/workshops will need to be either one, two hours or 3 hours in length. To best serve the coordinating of interpreters at the conference, all presentations shall be presented in the presenters' native language. Compensation for presenting will include conference registration and hotel accommodations will be provided for the lead presenter of each workshop. These items are negotiable for workshops involving multiple presenters.

Proposals must include:

- 1. Detailed abstract for the conference program (not to exceed 150 words)
- 2. Description for the program committee's consideration which includes the educational objectives, the instructional activities, the level of training (Beginning, Intermediate, or Advanced), and the length of time desired
 - (1, 2 or 3 hours) (Not to exceed 500 words)
- 3. Presenter's brief biography for the conference program (not to exceed 150 words)
- 4. Presenter's complete resume
- 5. Presenter's selfie picture (nice one please).
- 5. A/V equipment needs
- 6. Interpreting needs

The deadline for submitting proposals is Sept 30th, 2023.
